FROM THE PREZ

COLONEL SHOWER'S MEMORIAL

I did receive a few more donations and I believe that I should cut off the donation time period as of the 31s August. It was my intention to have something at the 8th AF Heritage Museum at he time of the convention. We have now received donations from 63 individual plus a donation from the 467th treasury. We have around 1,400 members and associates and a response of 63 is still only .045 % of the population a very meager response. In all, we are looking at three areas to have Colonel Shower memorialized. We have decided to donate to (1) the 2nd Air Division Memorial Library. (2) The Mighty Eighth Air Force Heritage Museum, and (3) possibly The Collins Foundation (B-24 All-American). To make these areas of memorial meaningful, we need your support. I believe there are many out there that want to be a part of this effort and I'm sure that I can expect additional contributions before the time period ends. There was only one "Al Shower" and we should recognize him for all he did for us in the 467th.

CONVENTION 2002

All we need now is to have you in attendance. The registration forms are in this issue. The cost is \$225.00 per person. The motel price is set at \$60.00 per person, single or double. The only trips planned will be transportation to and from the Heritage Museum on Friday. Friday will also have two memorial services at the 8th AFHM Memorial Chapel. One will

be at 11:00am and the second will be at 2:00pm. There will be a sign-up sheet at registration for time selection. necessary to do this as the Chapel will only hold around 80 and we do not want to over-crowd the service. There will be trips to the Museum and then to the City Market and River Street and back to Museum and motel on Saturday. City Market is a restored warehouse of a variety of shops, galleries and eating and drinking establishments. The outdoor sidewalk cafes of City Market lend a bit of Old World charm to Savannah. Market Street is your access to the Octoberfest in Savannah with many various stores crafts and eating-places. Representatives will be at the motel Thursday afternoon and Friday morning to schedule special tours such as: Ghost Tour, Island Tour, Shopping Tour, Book Tour and Dauphine Tour. They may have others, as they become available. Sunday as always is set aside for the business meeting and board meetings, so those not involved could schedule a tour on Sunday. We will have the large three-section hospitality space. which will afford itself to good conversation, reviews of memorabilia, snacks and drinks. An "on your own" snack lunch of soup, sandwich and drink will be available at the motel for those who wish to eat lunch at the motel on Friday and Saturday. It is also possible that the motel will have a restaurant in place at that time. The fact that the motel does not have a restaurant has been a real problem. I am using a food caterer from the area and caterers are not allowed to

have liquor license, I have gone to a liquor caterer who has license which may be OK for Friday and Saturday, Georgia law does not allow liquor to be sold or served on Sunday unless the motel has a restaurant has a Sunday liquor permit. The motel is still working on it and so is the Mayor. I will not know until around the time we arrive. This will mean that we will be unable to have cocktails and wine at the banquet. Of course, you may have liquor in your room, but you can't bring it with you to the banquet. The liquor was not the end of it. Just last week on July 11, I was advised that the Tax Exempt Form I signed was no good. It seems that Georgia does not give a Tax Exempt status for Veterans organization even if they have a 501 c (19) status. Georgia is very unfriendly to veterans and I believe this information should be known by other groups planning to have their conventions there.

If all goes as planned, I hope to have the Colonel Shower Memorial available in place at the Museum for all to see.

CONVENTION 2003

Progress to date is good for the San Antonio Convention in 2003. Believe me I have checked on the liquor regulations for the City of San Antonio and the State of Texas. Our review of the two hotels by Jim Gamble and Pete Hatton led to the of the Radisson Hotel, located at 502 West Durango Blvd., which is on the trolley line at a price of \$79.00 per night plus tax. Our dates have been changed to the last week in September to avoid the additional cost of \$13 to get the first week in October. A tour trip of the Missions is planned. One tour is scheduled in the morning and the other in the afternoon. At present, they plan to drop you off at an area where you can have lunch on your own and then back to the hotel or on to the tour. I'm not sure at this time if there will be a trip to one of the local Air Bases, if possible, I will try. San Antonio for many of us was a part of our introduction into the USAAF. We will hit the "Alamo" a one sure stop, plus some other missions. I need to know if anyone would like to visit the Sunken Gardens, now called the Japanese Tea Gardens. It was, as I remember, a very pretty place to visit. You will either have time to take the trolley to town and do some visiting as you see fit. I will also try to get someone to be on board for Thursday afternoon and Friday morning to sign up members for special trips, especially the river trip. At the present time, I still do not have any idea what is totally available.

CONVENTION 2004

Looking at two places right now. One is the Covington Kentucky area and the other is Las Vegas. Both have very good offers for hotel accommodations. It has been a while since we have had one in the Far West and we can discuss this in Savannah. If any of you have an idea better than Las Vegas to compete with Covington. Kentucky let me know. would be partial to Kentucky as it would be close to home. I will have more on this in the next issue.

PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION

It appears now that all our effort was in vein. The last we heard was that no one within the Air Force, Department of Defense or the White House believed that the 467th Bombardment Group (Heavy) participated in the real dangerous part of World war II to merit the Presidential Unit Citation for its actions. I did receive an article taken from the 2nd Air Division Journal, which is titled, "To Set The Record Straight". This was written by Dave Swearingen. In this article he quotes of an exceptional mission led by Col. Albert Shower and Swearinger's crew to Leipheim Air Field, Germany on April 24, 1944. (0% of the bombs fell within the 1,000-foot radius and all were within the 2,000-foot radius. For this effort, Col. Shower was awarded his first Distinguish Flying Cross and the 96th Combat Wing and its three Bomb Groups were awarded a Presidential Citation. I apologize to the individual that sent me

this article as I have misplaced his name. I have forward this information to my Representative's Chief of Staff to see what he can find out. If this fails, then I believe it is time to end this 10 to 12 year effort.

THE ROYAL OPENING OF THE FORUM

JULY 18th 2002

Jennifer Holland as Head of Libraries and Information did a really superb job and managed in the end to get all the Trust Governors and wives on the Guest list. We were also so pleased to have the President of the 2nd Air Division, Walter Mundy and Ruth also on the list.

After all the rehearsals and briefings everything went smoothly and I was so privileged to be able to show His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh around your unique 2nd Air Division Memorial Library. Her Majesty The Queen passed by our main door escorted by Jennifer Holland on her way to the Children's Library, while I waited nervously at our main entrance to be presented to HRH by Janet Holden, the Principal Librarian. I welcomed His Royal Highness and we made our way inside as I explained to him the vision that you had in the Forties that brought about this wonderful memorial. According to the briefing we should have looked at just the first part of the Mural, but the Duke was keen to see the entire mural so our well-rehearsed plan started to change. He was certainly touched by the whole concept as to how your Memorial Library began.

He then asked me to explain the Assembly Ship models (not in the plan!) before we then made our way into the Shrine Area and the Roll of Honour, which obviously moved him. Next I explained the WAC Key and the map of the bases which led me nicely on to explaining the massive role played by the 2nd Air Division Association in supporting the Memorial over so many years, including your wonderful Fulbright Scholar Librarian gift. Although we had been told that there could be no official presentations, I did ask if he would like to meet the 2nd ADA President and he readily agreed, so I presented Walter Mundy to him, and then quickly introduce Tom Eaton, Paul King and David Neale.

We then discussed staffing and I had a great chance to introduce Derek Hills and Andrea Hough. Time was now running out and I asked his Royal Highness if he would be willing to sign our Visitors Book and again he agreed. He was so charming and had spoken to everyone, that I decided to risk it all and ask him if he would accept one of the 2nd ADA Medallions as a memento of his visit (this was not in the programme). To my delight the Duke accepted and even better, which I think showed his interest in the entire project, he insisted on going back to Shrine Area and thanking the 2nd ADA President personally for the Medallion, so Walter got two chances to talk with him! So this memorable visit ended and we had only just over-run our allotted time by 1 minute. Her Majesty and the Duke then left the Forum to mingle with the huge crowd on Millennium Plain before finally leaving Norwich for Sandringham. Back in the Atrium we enjoyed champagne and canapés courtesy of the Forum Trust and there is no doubt that Robin Hall, the Chief Executive of the Forum Trust and Jennifer Holland of the County Council together with all their respective teams worked so hard to make the occasion the huge success. Certainly none of us will ever forget that day.

In the perfect evening we just relaxed at last over supper at home in Salhouse with Walter Mundy and his great RAF Lancaster pilot friend, but we were sad that Ruth was not well enough to travel and be with us. So a great day in the history of your living 2nd Air Division Memorial Library ended.



LETTERS & NOTES FROM MEMBERS

Merle Brown – Thank you for all your good work in getting us the POOP. It is always a real pleasure to hear from members of the 467th. I, along with all the other veterans of the group, was saddened at the passing of Col. Shower. In my opinion, he never received the credit he deserved for the great job he did in commanding our unit. Looking back, I now realize that he cared deeply for each one of us, while expecting us to do our best. The last time I saw the Commander was at Smokey Hill Air Force base in Kansas during early summer 1945. He was hoping to go to the Pacific Theater and wanted as many of the 467th members as possible to be with him. He never forgot us.

Evan Dastrup – I do want to make a contribution to Col. Shower's Memorial, but I don't have a lot to work with. I know that we are all in the "Golden Years", but I'm afraid I missed the gold – the years made it all right. I want to tell of a contact I had with Col. Shower some years ago. I believe it was early 1989. I was in La Canada, CA visiting a brother and had one of my sons with me. I had some extra time and got to thinking about the Colonel and thought I'd like to find him and visit. I knew he was in Riverside and I had his address from the POOP. So we drove over there and had no trouble finding the address – rang the bell – and there he was – tall as ever – still had his mustache – I swear, 45 years just melted away. I had never talked to him before. (I

guess at Rackheath, the object was not to). I said, Col. Shower, I'm Evan Dastrup, does that name mean anything to your memory? He hesitated just a moment and then said. Dastrup - yeah, you were one of my aircraft commanders - what brings you here? We visited a bit and then he said, why don't we go over to March Field and go through the museum while we talk. Well, we left our car, got in his Lincoln and did just that. Had a wonderful 2-3 hours together and had a great time. A "star" day for my son - he thought the Col. was very impressive - has talked of the day many times. I saw him again at Omaha and at Tucson. The only two conventions I've been able to work in. Ralph, just wanted to tell the story. He said there were those who "hated his guts" - well not I - greatest C>O> I ever had - greatest experience of my life at Rackheath, UK. (Editor's note: Evan, it didn't take many too long to realize what a great leader the Colonel was, especially when so many of us came home!)

Allen Welters - Again enjoyed receiving Poop From Group and it was sad news to read that our Comdr. Col. Shower has left us for his Eternal Assignment up in that peaceful Blue Yonder. Now we have to carry on as he had us trained to do in our 467th. At present I am recovering from cancer & serious back problems and to write a letter for Poop from Group will help get the mind off pain & problems. Besides that have decided to try to find someone connected to a crewless landing I remember. One of our B-24's made a landing in a meadow somewhere to the south of Norwich. The B-24's Ser. # 4252623 was a 788th Sqd. A/C at the beginning, then was assigned to our 789th Sqd. Its nose art was a large vellow rabbit posed with bomb overhead with the name "Wabbit" in large yellow letters. As memory serves me - I remember that taking place in Feb. of 1945. It returned from a mission low on gas, I saw the crew bail out over our field & Wabbit flew on crewless. About 2 weeks later it was flown back to our base, I saw it land & waited for it to come in to it's hardstand & looked it over very closely, the only item noticeable was long grass pinched between nose wheel rim & tire. I would very much appreciate hearing from a crewmember of the crew that bailed out or anyone in connection with the return of Wabbit to our Sqd, & to go on flying missions until the war ended. About 3 or 4 days after the war ended, Wabbit crashed when it went over the end of the SE-NW runway because of a runaway supercharger - a real sad ending for a great OLE Rabbit. Time is rowing short so would surely appreciate hearing from someone in connection to that low gas mission to help me back up my memory & peace of mind. With all best wishes to all of you comrades, especially those who have exchanged letters or wrote letters to me in the years since we were at Rackheath. Thank you all again and God Bless you all.

Anthony R. Smolar - I feel honored and privileged to contribute to a Memorial for Col. Albert J. Shower, USAF Retired. He was a fine leader whose precepts and policies did much to insure the safety of the personnel assigned to his command. The fine record of the performance of the 467th BG (H) was due directly to his astute leadership. His passing evokes a feeling of deep

sorrow, but with fond memories of all his accomplishments.

CAPTAIN CHARLES J. WHITE (Cont. from 21-1)

He never knew the full extent of the trouble—nor, throughout the rest of the flight, would he ever learn the exact details of the damage his plane had sustained. (Actually, much of the Constellation's triple-finned tail had been sliced off by the jet's passing wing-tip.) At first, all Captain White knew was that his crippled aircraft was tipping left and down into a headlong descent. And he was discovering, as he began fighting to regain command of the plane, that he had no functioning control surfaces—the movable panels on the wings and tail—to pull out of the dive.

Under the best of circumstances, the pilot's voice comes through the loudspeakers into the passenger cabin a bit muffled, vaguely impersonal. But any accent of fear will filter through. Even as their own emotions were drifting to the edge of panic, the passengers marveled at the absolute calm in the voice they heard: "This is the Captain speaking. We've had a mid-air collision. Please fasten your seat belts."

And then: "We're out of control. Brace yourselves the best you can for a crash landing. You won't be hearing from me anymore. I'm going to be a little busy up here."

Converging Blips

Just 40 minutes earlier, climbing out from Boston, the flight had begun as the epitome of routine travel —a Saturday-afternoon shuttle run to Newark, NJ, weather cheerfully clear, traffic only normally dense, a flight plan so ordinary that it was activated by the push of a single button on a computer at the Air Traffic Control Center. The plan called for Captain White to fly southwest (into the sun), at an altitude of 10,000 feet, to the Carmel navigational beacon in South Salem, N.Y., and then turn slightly left to approach the landing pattern at Newark.

A cross-section of air travelers was aboard, preoccupied with commonplace, if widely differing interests. Midway along the left side, Father Patrick Healy, a Catholic priest on home leave after seven years in Japan, made small talk with Lt. Marilyn Schreiber, a tall, attractive Navy nurse. Across the aisle, a young Negro woman dandled her year-old baby, who was happily playing peek-a-boo with the stranger in the row behind them, a sales executive named James Beardsell. But Beardsell, who had been a B-24 pilot in World War II, was secretly worried that the plane was just above a cloud deck. He had once experienced the narrowest of near misses when flying his bomber through clouds.

A young couple near the front were kissing, oblivious to the bizarre sight of a gold earring worn by a college boy in the row ahead. Like the trip itself, Bert Pietranski's earpiece was part of a fraternity-hazing gag. His fellow fraternity pledge, Jeff Klein, was handcuffed by the right wrist to a briefcase. The boys were supposed to be playing the roles of characters in a spy-thriller, and their unplanned trip— launched with a one-way ticket, a loaded camera and no cash— (Continued in 21-3)
