COLONEL SHOWER'S MEMORIAL

The final count of Colonel Shower's memorial fund was 87 contributors (four gave twice) plus the 467th Bomb Group contribution, which made every member a contributor. The final dollar figure was \$10,485.00. Two black granite etchings were made for a cost of \$3,285.00, one for the Mighty Eighth AF Heritage Museum and the other for the Second Air Division Memorial Library. A donation of \$1,000 was made to the Collings Foundation to have the Colonel's name moved from the DFC area to the cockpit area. The balance of \$6,200.00 was split between the Eighth AF Museum and the Memorial Library for book endowment and specific funds. The Memorial Library received \$3,100.00 for a book endowment in Colonel The 8th AF Museum received Shower's name. \$3,100.00 with \$1,000.00 designated for a book endowment and the balance of \$2,100.00 being earmarked for funds to support the relocation of the B-24 nose from Duxford. A proviso was put in that in the event the B-24 nose acquisition does not materialize

within the next two years; the funds will revert to the general fund for use as deemed necessary by the museum. The etching at the museum has been put on the wall directly behind our memorial. They moved the B-17 plaque that was there to accommodate us. The etching in the Memorial Library has been placed in the Second Air Division room in the Memorial, which also holds the pictures of General Kepner and General Hodges. A most appropriate place. David Hastings took care of this for us as well as to put a plaque below it to identify the Colonel. The 467th and the 2ndAD are extremely lucky to have such a devoted and loval gentleman supporting us in all of our endeavors. I know that the Shower family deeply appreciates our remembrance of Colonel Shower and for them and us we wish to thank everyone for their kind consideration and participation.

BOB MCEWEN'S MEMORIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

A total donation of \$500.00 was received for Bob. An amount was contributed form the 467th funds so that all participated. I have contacted Ruth and she agrees that we should send it to the Second Air Division Memorial Library Book Fund. She stated that Bob very much supported the Memorial Library and she preferred that the funds be placed there to purchase books. Ruth, Bob's family and us thank all of you who participated in remembrance of Bob.

CONVENTION 2002

Attendance this year was lower than any year before. We varied between 106 to 129 attendance for the five days. Perhaps it was the fact that we did not have one in 2001 combined with the economy, 9/11 and we seem to be reducing in numbers. For all the problems preceding this convention, the final outcome was very good. Everyone enjoyed the food. The Friday Memorials at the Chapel of Fallen Eagles went well. Our data was in place and the Black Granite etching of Colonel Shower was very impressive. Friday was spent at the Museum or in the Hospitality room. Saturday was spent at the Octoberfest in Savannah or at the Museum or Hospitality room. We had all three large rooms opened up for our Hospitality room and it allowed us to have videos, music, snacks and conversations. The motel had been revamped, but lacked for certain conveniences like telephone service. They did move some to other rooms where possible. Ann Russell, our caterer, really did an outstanding job of serving food under the most trying conditions. One dinner evening, all the power went out in the kitchen except for one wall plug, which they used with a drop cord. The dishwasher was inoperative and the ice machine was broke. On the night of the banquet, the exhaust fan guit and the kitchen looked like the time we had a fog takeoff on an early morning mission. The personnel working at the motel were very helpful, but the ownership had much to learn about supporting a convention. The motel is an ideal setup for conventions in Pooler to be near the 8th Museum. Ann and her husband Danny took care of both the meals and the bar service. We had cocktails Thursday, Friday and Saturday; Sunday was your own bottle as the county is dry. Banquet night, Bob Wyatt won the TV/VCR; Bob Samuel, Jr. won the door prize radio/CD player; and Vincent LaRussa was the lucky draw on the Freebee Drawing. Our business meeting was very fruitful as we had Andrew and Andrea Hawker to cover various points about the Memorial Library. Andrew is the newest Memorial Trust Governor. I will try to get a decision before the next newsletter. Lets make San Antonio a good one.

CONVENTION 2003

At the present time, all arrangements have been completed. I will not put a registration form in this newsletter, as the exact cost has not been finalized. Meals are considerably higher in this area, but I'm sure many of you will enjoy returning to an area where you possibly started your military career. The hotel in on the trolley line and we will try to get passes for Thursday through Saturday. The trolley goes to riverfront and various areas of San Antonio that may be of interest to the group. Jim Gamble is looking into the base tour. Since I do not know who or how many would want to do this tour, I at present plan to have it as an optional tour that you can sign up and pay for during the registration. The tours add to the overall costs and it is deemed better to let this one be as an option. The hotel we are staying at is the Radisson and is located at 502 West Durango Boulevard, San Antonio, TX 78207, telephone 210-224-9130. I once again set planning at 150 attendance. The Pooler convention averaged 113. This affects cost and cancellations impact our end costs. PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION

One of these days, we may get it or die trying. Someone, whom I do not remember, sent me an article out of the Second Air Division Journal that was an article by Dave Swearingen that was titled. "To Set The Record Straight". The article states that the 467th, along with the 96th Combat Wing and the other two groups of the wing were awarded the Presidential citation. On this mission, which the 467th led along with Colonel Shower as Command Pilot, it is quoted from General Order 327, dated April 1944; "For extraordinary achievement while leading a Combat Wing of B-24s on a bombing mission deep into Germany on 24 April 1944. With skillful airmanship Colonel Shower directed the Combat Wing formation to its important target where bombs were released with devastating effect." For this, Colonel Shower received his first Distinguished Flying Cross. This article was forwarded to my congressman's chief of staff for him to check into this and see if this will add any weight to our effort to receive the PUC.

5. Brian Mahoney stated that he had been made the Communication VP of the Heritage League. His task was to make it more lively and to pick-up education. He would also work closely with the Friends of the Trust in England. Walt Mundy mentioned that he had made an effort to bring together the Heritage League and the 2ADA by attending the Heritage League meeting in Scottsdale, AZ meeting to basically enhance relationships between the 2ADA and the Heritage League. To his knowledge, he was the first 2ADA President to attend their meetings.

6. Ralph Davis brought up the fact that the Board and the 2 AD VPs have in the past voted their own conscience when it came to actions effecting the 467th. A situation evolved during the last Executive meeting at the Baltimore 2ADA convention which supported the Memorial Library, but denied support to the 8th AFHM to assist in bringing the B-24 nose section over from Duxford. A discussion resulted from the membership and finally a show of hands vote was taken as to what support the membership expected. The vote was unanimous that the 467th membership wanted support to both the 8th AFHM and the Memorial Library. Additional discussion resulted in which;

a. Andrew Hawker was asked and he requested to address the members. He said he was most happy to have met the families of Gregory, Touchette and Stevens in England. He extended the greetings to the group from David Hastings. They all attended the relocation of the Miney plaque on the new building. He said both the Miney plaque and our monument were in great shape. The dedication of he B-24 at Duxford has been completed and the B-24 is now in the Museum. It is my understanding that it took quite a maneuver to get it in because of its size and other aircraft within the museum. Andrew said he had a most enjoyable chat with C. J. Roberts, CEO and President of the 8th AFHM. He invited him to Norwich if he has time during his visit to England next year. He said he enjoyed the museum very much and made several visits to it during his stay. The new Fulbright Scholar Librarian, Tahitia Orr has arrived and in place. In a discussion of the funds required to keep the Memorial Library functioning, he said that they need to raise \$750,000.00 to insure that it is operating in the manor we conceived back in 1945. There have been 1.2 million visitors with a variance of 100,000 to 500,000 visitors to the library each week. There are 6,700 fallen eagles noted within the memorial section. It is dedicated friends like Andrew Hawkins. David Hastings and too many others to mention that keeps the memory and function of our 2AD Memorial Library alive and well. Those of us who were there will always remember what we and those who didn't returned shared at a crucial time period in our lives.

b. Walter Mundy spoke up in support of the 8th AFHM and the 2AD Memorial Library. A discussion evolved regarding the concerns of the support to the 8th AFHM and the 2AD Memorial Library,

c. Geoff Gregory stated that this discussion was resulting from his vote at the Executive meeting in Baltimore and gave his comments regarding his vote at the 2AD meeting regarding support to the 8^{th} AFHM and the 2AD Memorial Library. Geoff made the comment that no one told him how to vote as 2AD VP representing the 467th BG.

d. Vince LaRussa stated how much the 467 th had given to the 2AD and that we need to support both the Memorial Library and the 8th AFHM. A comment was made of just how much was required to keep the Library functioning.

e. Andrew Hawker stated that the current drive for \$750,000.00 would be sufficient to support the Library as proposed for perpetuity.

f. Bodie Malone made a motion that the members should identify what they want the board and the 2AD VP to support in all occasions whether as the 467^{th} or at the 2ADA.

g. Paul Hatten stated he agreed with Vince LaRussa

h. Walter Mundy made a statement that he was the first to donate with his will and Geoff Gregory agreed that he beat him to it.

i. Bodie Malone reminded the group that a motion was made that the Board and 2AD VP do what the membership of the 467^{th} want regarding all future actions. A vote was taken again and it again was unanimous to support both the Memorial Library and the 8th AFHM, Jack Stevens seconded it.

j. Jack Stevens also made a recommendation that became a motion that this type data should be sent out to the membership by e-mail and through the newsletter and that the Board should handle it as it now knows the desire of the membership. Geoff Gregory seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

k. A discussion resulted regarding the advantage of having Geoff Gregory in as 2AD VP since Walter Mundy has a vote as Past President for the next three years. With Geoff on board, it gives the 467th two votes in the 2 AD Executive meeting. Tony Maris made the motion that Geoff be put back as the 467th 2AD VP. It was second by Vincent LaRussa and the motion passed unanimously.

7. A motion was made by Walter Mundy that the meeting be adjourned, seconded by Vincent LaRussa, and the next meeting will be in San Antonio, Texas at the Radisson Hotel.

NEW BOARD MEETING

The Board meeting was brought to order by President Ralph Davis. Attending was Vincent La Russa, Vincent Re, John Upp, Paul Hatten, Walt Mundy, Bodie Malone and Ralph Davis.

1. The new board recognized Bodie Malone, the newly elected member for a three-year term.

2. The responsibility of the 2 AD VP was discussed as a result of the membership voting in the business meeting and to keep the group apprised of 2AD actions. A letter will be sent to Dick Butler, 2ADA president putting Geoff Gregory in as 467th 2AD VP until Walter Mundy's Past President period runs out. This gives the 467th two votes on 2AD matters.

3. The discussion of officers came up. Bodie Malone made a motion to have Paul Hatten continue as Vice President. John Upp second the motion and all agreed.

4. It was discussed to contact Tony Bell to see if he would run for the Director at the next convention.

5. The liability for convention period was discussed. It was determined that we should look into liability coverage or have our incorporation moved to a state that limits the liability of the officers and the board.

6. It was suggested that we contact Ed King on legal matters since the death of Bill McGovern. Ralph Davis will contact Ed to see if he agrees and will support us.

7. A motion was made to have Valerie Corvino accept the position of Secretary. The motion was made by John Upp and seconded by Vincent Re.




