NEWS FROM STATION 145

This has been a hectic year with new walls being built around your lovely Marker, the granite chippings replaced and the shrubs cut back. Also new floodlights have been installed. Additional pictures have been placed in the 467th Room at the Church and the new Coffey Crew Gates are much admired. The restored Control Tower has caused much interest to the many visitors we have had and we cannot thank Will Minns and his team enough for all their support. One big loss is that Jill Hollis-Graves has had to leave Tilia Properties due to ill health - we will miss her greatly.

The visit of the American author Marjorie Parker (see separate article) to the old base was deeply appreciated by the Village and she was impressed by the way your history has been preserved.

Another huge talking point is the announcement by the Government that Rackheath has been chosen as a site for one of their new Ecotowns. The Developer asked to see me to discuss the history of the airfield and we had a useful meeting. We have another meeting planned in 3 weeks times when I will receive all the documents and they are going to use me as their link with the 467th and field history. I also attended the Public meetings at the School, held over two days and they were packed out as this plan has caused huge concern as the development will totally change the character of Rackheath. I did raise the point that the proposed new town will cover the entire airfield site and if we are not careful all traces of the wartime airfield will vanish. They are proposing over 5000 new houses, plus light industry, a lake and Wind turbines. They agree that they will continue the policy of naming the roads after one American and one British name, and perhaps they will leave the main runway as a reminder of our wartime history. I had hoped that in view of the current economic climate that the development might be slowed, but yesterday the Government announced that the Rackheath site was their No,1.

Finally, we need your help on the long term care of your Marker and artifacts. The initial fund that you set-up in 1990 is now almost exhausted and we await your advice.

This Sunday is Remembrance Sunday in Éngland when we remember all those who died in the Wars. Once again the 2nd Air Division Association will lay a Wreath during the service and I will have the pleasure of escorting John Lee in the ceremony. After the Cathedral service we will have the pleasure of giving all six of the 2nd Air Division Association party lunch at our house which will be fun.

Razzano, Anthony F (Anthony's Obituary was somehow miss placed and only just recovered, my apologies) MARMORA, N.J. – Anthony F. Razzano died Monday, May 10, 2004 at Somers Point, N.J. Shore Memorial Hospital. Born in Watervliet on June 24, 1923, he was the son of the late Vincent and Mary DeRossa Razzano. Mr Razzano was a graduate of Watervliet High School and was the band leader while in High School. He took several courses at Union College in Schenectady. He was an Army veteran of World War II serving as a Sergeant and was an Areal Gunner in the Army Air Corps 467th Bombardment Group. "PRACTICE DISASTER" by Ed King, crew commander

And was it the "Massillon Tiger" that we took out on that disastrous practice mission one sunny day, when a sudden and vicious winter storm swept in over the British Isles and northern Europe like an express train? The practice mission having been called back, our formation headed out over the North Sea, looking for a way down through the solid cloud mass which was engulfing us. We were in the last squadron to turn and head down through the clouds, partly within a small "canyon" of clear space within that otherwise solid undercast. We broke out of the clouds a few hundred feet above the water, but as we proceeded toward the east coast of England, the cloud ceiling pushed us lower and lower, closer and closer to that icy water.

Laval Beniot, our radio operator (God rest his Soul) was plumbing our height above the water by measuring out the trailing radio antenna until he got a voltage drop! The cloud mass was now right on top of us, and we appeared to be no more than 75 feet over the water when I decided that disaster was surely waiting for us just ahead and I opted to peel out of the formation and start climbing up into the cloud mass as we neared London.

We climbed up and agonizingly up and around in that solid overcast until we finally broke out on top at about 22,000 feet! That climb on instruments proved to be the worst ordeal of my short flying career. (I had at one point in that long climb suffered a complete loss of orientation, hope, and faith in my instruments, so that I was ready to just let go and let the plane take us into the North Sea (or whatever was under us); but Tom Elsen's (copilot) encouraging voice got through to me and made me take hold again and come back fighting.

Once on top, we flew for hours, up and down the east coast of England - - figuring that if we could not eventually find a clearing to come down for a visual landing, we would fly inland a way when the gas got low, let the crew bail out, and then head the ship out over the North Sea before we hit the silk. Meanwhile, we hoped that our IFF was sending out the right signal so that English ACK ACK would not start trying to bring us down!

We were in radio contact with the base, asking if there was ANY field open ANYWHERE IN EUROPE where we would have a chance of landing: but there was NO place open. That winter storm had socked in all of northwest Europe! So we flew and flew, periodically measuring our gas, and every eye on board straining to find a hole in that cotton mattress beneath us. Finally one of the waist gunners screamed "I see a light on the ground! A light on the ground!", and having found the hole, I upended the "Massillon Tiger" and we spiraled down through that skinny little chimney until we broke out several hundred feet above the ground, practically on top of RACKHEATH! What a Navigator Ed Gore was! (But we wouldn't have cared if we were over Germany!)

But we still had three significant problems: (1) The windows and windshield had iced up so badly on that trip down the chimney that I could not see through the windshield well enough to be sure I could land; (2) Either our gas was about gone, or the carburetors were iced up so much that the engines were having trouble digesting the gasoline - - splutter, sputter; and (3) Rackheath field had a solid, thick blanket of snow covering everything: there were no runways visible!

(1) I slid open the side window beside my seat and reached out and around the windshield in front of me - - a wrench in my hand - - and chopped a small, 50c piece hole in the ice in front of me, but big enough (and soon enough so that my frozen hand did not drop off!). (2) & (3) We prayed for the engines not to quit, and advised the Tower that we were in serious trouble and had to have the lights turned on so we could find a runway PDQ.

(3) The Tower operator flicked a switch, and lo and behold we could see ONE, PARTIAL string of runway lights shining mistily through a snow cover, on ONE side of a runway. "Which side of the runway are those lights on?" we asked. "I don't know. They are still out there shoveling and I don't have any contact with them or anyone to find out." "Curses" (or something like that) we said; FIND OUT before we run out of gas!" He said he was leaving the Tower: don't panic; he would go out and find out and call us back.

A heckuva long time and a few engine coughs later, having lost all human contact with the outside world, I decided that we had better GO FOR IT! I bet our lives that the few runway lights were on the left side of the runway, and we went in. As I neared the depthless white sheet and began to flair out, my 50c hole rose up and looked at the black sky! The lights had passed from view, and the rudders were getting very mushy, and I rode the hell out of them, PRAYING that it would not be a crash landing from 30 feet in the air!

And then softly, gently, the nose came down and we realized that we were ON THE RUNWAY and rolling it out! The softest, smoothest landing I ever made in my life! (A few hours earlier, I wouldn't have bet a nickel on her survival (the "Massillon Tiger") - - or ours!) Ed King

We of the 467th decided to make one additional trip to Rackheath and the Norwich area in 2010 per our Business Meeting at our Convention in St. Louis this year. According to the Eastern Daily Press Monday, October 20, 2008 issue, there may no longer be a Rackheath. Maybe we should consider a stateside city. The Eco Town Proposals as stated are "sensible and deliverable". The name Eco Town is apropos as throughout that area you can hear the echo of the voices of the thousands of men of the 467th. It all started on the 12th of March, 1943 when ground and air crews arrived at Rackheath. Colonel Shower in his commanding tone giving directive orders to his staff and The pleasant voice of Colonel Creager as he crews. administered the ground affairs of the auxiliary units as head of the 375th Air Service Group. Colonel Walker, the Executive Officer taking care of Housekeeping affairs and all the personnel problems. There was also other Executive officers, Lieutenant Colonels Herzberg and Mahoney. And who can forget Lieutenant Colonel Walter R. Smith who was the Operations Officer, who ran everything, and ran it well. Many of these officers flew combat as well as Little Pete, the Colonel's P-47. There was always something going on at the Squadron level including Wallace, Salzarulo, Rider, Carter, Holdrege, and Mahoney. Can you hear the trucks moving the bombs to the aircraft and then the trucks taking the crews out to their aircraft. If you ask David Hastings, Perry Watts, Bob Lomax or Andy Wilkinson, they would tell you the echoes are all around Rackheath. Even the late Leslie Willis would agree. If England, as a staunch advisory, had not stood up to the Germans in the early years, there never would have been a Rackheath for us Yanks. These echoes are all around you, all but the lost voices of 235 boys, no men who never returned to Rackheath or the country they loved. Other echoes might be from Ralph Elliott, Bob Sheehan, Dave Swearinger or Blackie Dunnam. The echo of the many bicycles on their way to the Green Man, Norwich or the surrounding area. Then will you ever forget the echoes of those Pratt & Whitney engines on our B-24's taking off for another mission. All these echoes could be preserved for our children and children's children to visit and see where their father or grandfather made history by exposing himself to danger to preserve our countries for future generations. It is only a piece of the runway, but every inch of that concrete is dear to me. I have always been proud of the English as they seem to preserve history. The Memorial Library is nice, but it is not the past that the members of the 467th want to leave and have for future generations. There is not that much left of Rackheath, but what is left is near and dear to every man women and child associated with the 467th Bombardment Group (Heavy). To all our English friends, we will never forget you as we know, you will never forget us. God Bless England and God Bless the United States of America. Do you hear the echoes? FROM THE RECTORY

One Spring Morning

On a Tuesday, being a day off, there's usually more time for a longer walk with Joe, the Rectory hound. So with coats for Joe and myself, we're both getting on a bit you understand, we stride off towards the industrial estates. Of course Joe has to leave his mark on the Rectory hedge as we go pass, to let other sniffing dogs know that he lives here; and has politely return the barks of other hounds as we proceed up the lane. We dive into the footpath which leads us past builders of yachts and larger craft, sellers of garden sundries and an omnibus depot; our noses assailed by pungent smells of resin, paint and hot machine oil.

Our path changes from concrete to grass and we turn through a gap in the hedge. There before us is the perfectly restored control tower of Rackheath Air Base, home of the 467th Bombardment Group (Heavy), during the last years of the Second World War. It rests in the early morning sun, its walls now painted a light green, its rooftop viewpoint still waiting for some anxious officer, hoping against hope, for his men to safely return, like gnats on the distant flat Norfolk horizon. For this is a place of memories.

We skirt the edge of the field, already the birds are starting to practice for Spring proper. Coming in low towards us is a single plane, low in the sky, with high wings and twin turbo-props, the regular shuttle from Holland, lifting one wing as it lines up for the final approach to Norwich Airport. We stand and watch, thinking of the other planes which flew past this tower, 5538 of them, crewed by men from Chappaqua, Madison, Pawtucket, Caracas, Piqua and elsewhere.

Joe and I continue our walk, reaching the remains of the concrete main runway; it stretches away into the distance. It's not difficult to stand there and think of those men, packed into their Liberators, with tons of high explosive below their feet, as thirty tons of men, machine and bombs struggled into the air and turned towards the rising sun, 235 never returned to this quiet Norfolk field, now the birds of the countryside sing them a requiem as the sun rises and the haze clears. This is a place of lasting memories.

Those memories were made over sixty years ago; soon we'll be thinking of just one brave man, a man who 2,000 years ago challenged the evil and wrong of the world. Jesus Christ gave his life working for what is good and right, he loved the unloved, cared for those who were suffering and told us to be like children before we enter into God's Kingdom. His was a life of love, compassion and humility. Then one Spring morning he walked out towards the rising sun, dragging his cross. He gave his life to give us ours, and he waits for us to follow after him. This Easter and every Sunday we retell the story of Jesus Christ, God's Son on earth, please join us as we journey together.

We are glad to report another very busy year, but also sadly some major expenses which has depleted the reserves. In the 467th Room inside the Church we have added 12 more pictures to the collection as well as the two superb plaques donated by Andy DeBiasse and the whole display looks very good. Sadly our Vicar, the Reverend Richard Sutton has just retired and we will miss him.

The 467th seat beside the Village sign is now looked after by the Parish Council and is in good repair. The Bronze plaque is kept clean and we have corrected the B.24 Tail colours on the Village Sign.

The Marker itself looks superb with the new brickwork and the silver lettering. Thanks to Robert Lomax the flagpoles have been repainted. The fault with the lights has at last been found and again thanks to Robert they are now working with a new unit installed at the front. The bushes have been cut back at the rear and Jill Hollis-Graves from Tilia Properties has kindly joined the small team that keeps your Marker clean and tidy. Her support is deeply appreciated.

The Private Miney Plaque is as always well looked after by that great team at Contact Electrical and is looking smart.

In the T4 hangar owned by Solus we have given them pictures of "Witchcraft" and in Mahoney Green we have presented to Dynarod, one of the leading firms on that road, with pictures of James Mahoney for display in their reception area.

Working with Broadland District Council we now have the following roads in Rackheath named in your honour. Wendover Road, Albert Shower Road, Liberator Close, Witchcraft Way and Mahoney Green. We have some names in reserve ready for any new roads when they are built. We have also worked with the Council to keep the signs in good repair as well as asking them to prevent the parking of cars in front of the Marker.
