Poop From Group, Volume 3, No. 4, was mailed soon after April 15, 1983. I sent 725 copies to 467th people and 21 to others in the 2nd Air Division Association. To date, only 8 467th copies have been returned as non-deliverable. So we had 717 good 467th addresses. Since then I have sent in 37 computer cards, deleting those 8 from the computer, changing 8 addresses that I have been notified of and ADDING the 21 new names that you have sent me. A good bit of progress for a few months, a net 21 gain, but a long way to go to double the roster by our October reunion in Dayton.

I have received 146 letters, including 70 reservations for 134 people for the Dayton reunion and 58 donations to the mail-memorial fund, \$1180, and 36 donations to the mail-memorial fund, 31180, but nearly half of that from one individual. This amount leaves a long way to go toward the memorial at Dayton even considering the \$5 per attendee at Dayton going to the memorial. Your math will show over 600 non-responders to this appeal. Let me hear from each of you positively!

I believe I have acknowledged each reserva-tion and each donation. But in the rush to do so before going to England May 21, I know I missed en-closures in some mailings. I believe I have now rectified all of my errors, if not let me know please.

We could not have been received by Norwich and Norfolk County in any nicer manner, we were treated as distinguished guests, not as visitors. The theme of the reunion, "We came as friends, we stayed as friends, we remained friends", was wholly reciprocated by the British. The major events of the reunion, arranged and scheduled by the Chairman and Governors of the Memorial Trust of the 2nd AD, were all well attended and enjoyed by the participants. Thursday evening we had a Buffet Supper at the Norwood, which many of you will remember as the Lido Ballroom of 1944-45. Friday there was a Special Service of Thanksgiving at the Church of St. Peter Mancroft, opposite the City Hall and Li-brary. The conclusion of the service was the Dedication of New Standards, an American flag and a 2nd Air Division flag, which were then processed to the Memorial Library Room followed by attendees of the service. After lunch a new film tribute to the 2nd Air Division, "Remember Them", principally to be shown to British school youth, was shown for us. Saturday, after the business meeting, a great number went to RAF Coltishal to participate in the Station Family Day. Especially enjoyed was the flying exhibition by a Harrier, vertical take off and landing, flying backward, high and low speed flight and then a bow to the appreciative audience. Saturday evaning to the appreciative audience. urday evening we were given a Civic Reception and Buffet Supper by The Lord Mayor of Norwich and The Chairman of the Norfolk County Council. Sunday a well attended Memorial Service was held at the United States Military Cemetary at Cambridge. Others went on a boat trip on the Wroham Broads and then visited Blickling Hall.

Monday morning and afternoon we had trips

to the base areas, the reunion highlight.

The 467th had first a Memorial Service at Rackheath All Saints Old Church, a fifteenth century church now maintained by the New Rackheath community but about four miles from it and probably a mile north of the Wroxham Road. Then to New Rackheath for the dedication and unveiling of the village sign which prominently features our 467th B-24 Liberator, meaning that our operation from Rackheath airdrome was one of the most significant events in the over 700 year history of this area. (See Photos) Following this was a reception in the New Rackheath All Saints Church and each of us could not have been treated more graciously. From there to the Green Man for lunch. This should have been our opportunity for a Group mini-reunion but due to the crowded conditions, caused by the 458th BG being with us to The 458th left this time, it was impossible to do so. us after lunch and we began our coach tour of the base. David Hastings, of the Board of Governors of The Memorial Trust of the Second Air Division, lives in Salhouse. He visited the base as a youngster when the Group was there and was one of our guides. Peter Bond, a friend of the 467th and 2nd ADA, has visited, explored, extensively on the base in the last two years and was our other guide. I don't believe we veterans really remembered very much; possibly, Sir Edward Stracy's Rackheath Hall, now not occupied after being for many years an antique shop, the control tower, though not complete, still recognizable, the T-2 hanger in the technical site, Group Headquarters, though partially torn down, the gymnasium (possibly), the NCO Club (possibly) and some still standing Seco hunts (stucco plastered brick exterior, vertical sides, unlike Nissen huts) which, we believe were for permanent party of base, not the transiant flying crews, some Nissen huts scattered about. Dadid and especially, Peter, were very helpful to us in explaining what they knew or surmissed to be the original uses of the remaining structures and improvements. The accompaning photos are of this visit and a 35 MM slide presentation will be shown at the Dayton Reunion. Monday night we had the closing Banquet with A. E. "Rocky" Rothchild representing the 467th in the candle lighting memorial service. Two gripes and I'm done. Not all 467th people were in same hotel. This made it virtually impossible to

get together, to mini reunion, to get to know one another. It would have taken extraordinary planning to have gotten us all in one hotel, I think it should have been done. Second, seating at the Banquet was not by Groups, it would have been much more effective had it been so, but was decided against in order to save the seating time lost (used) at the last two conventions.

This is one of the letters I've received and enjoyed reading. I hope you enjoy it also. Dear Phillip:

Your note along with the "Poop From Group" sheets came yesterday. These were read completely and put me to reminiscing. Thanks for taking the extra time to bring me up to date on what has been happening. Almost forty years has passed and right now it all seems to run together. I was "over there" twenty months and right now there seems to be very little I can recall about it all. I will try to relay some of my thoughts which may or may not be of interest.

I was on the Queen Mary that sailed from New

York in early Nov. 1943, I believe. It took us four days and 18 hours to get to "Firth of Forth" in Scotland. We went by train down to Rackheath and were given a couple of blankets, the cushion bed and the bolster pillow. Never got warm until Spring. Was a member of the Station Compliment Squadron. Rackheath Aerodrome was still under construction. We were impressed at the was still under construction. We were impressed at the way the "limies" worked, reminded us of our WPA, and the time out for "tea" was our coffee break forerunner. We were anxious to get on with the war and get back home. Seemed like an endless wait for the airplanes to get there. Meantime I was assigned to "base defense".

We later referred to the school as Kilkeel Tech.

The B-24s finally came and I was subsequently assigned to the control tower as a radio telephone operator. "Hello Decktray. hello Decktray this is Shirtmaker G George. Request landing instructions."

"Shirtmaker George, Decktray, landing on 21, 10 miles cross wind call on your final approach, over." Watching the missions take off. writing down the time with ing the missions take off, writing down the time with grease pencil. Watching them return, the sick feeling when one or more didn't make it back. The continuous roar overhead and then watching for the double yellow

flares.

I remember too the 100 mission party, also the 200 mission party along with the air show and the disaster. How the beer was poured on the ground after the crash. The sick feeling. "Snoopy", "Witchcraft", "Bugs Bunny" and all the rest.

I remember the announcement about the war being over heard on the Tannoi standing in the rain by my bike. On my way to the village, the Rackheath dances. Dancing to the Gramophone. Songs like "My Heart Tells Me" and "Shinning Hour".

Names I remember besides Col. Shower, Lt. Galvin, "Corky" Cocran from Klamath Falls Ore, Sgt. Archie Wasden from Utah, Samuel A. Tarrent from Alabama, Sgt. Ira R. Fall from Miss., Ernest Silverburg from New York, Jack Thompson from Conn., "Nat" Dutro, Vince Conden. A Peterson from Pittsburg. Sorry I can't remember more right now. Isn't that pitiful?

Would like to go over there but not enough no-tice to make plans this time. Would like to look up the Wards. Ted was a Chef in the merchant Navy. His daughters were "Paddy" Hazel and Lorna. His wife's maiden name was Norton and her Brother Frank ran "the

Kaiser engineers, Yakima, Washington. Met and married Maxine Day from Iowa. Jefferson Chemical, now Texaco, six children, all graduated from college. After 27 years - retirement.

A trip to Canada last summer, gardening, singing in the church choir. Ringing hand bells, gardening. Just goofing around. Taking up jogging. Up to 3 miles per day.

RACKHEATH VILLAGE SIGN

The small panel on the left of the picture shows a Postmill to represent the one which once stood in the village. In 1268 in the reign of Henry III, Roesia de Blakenham granted by fine to Robert de Martham a windmill in Rackheath Magna paying one mark per annum for ever, Robert agreeing that she and her heirs and the whole family living in her court and belonging to her or her heirs should have the first grinding thereat and toll free as often as they sent any of their family to the mill.

In the background at the top of the main panel, the Parish Church of All Saints can be seen and next to the Church are two deer representing Rackheath Hall and its parkland.

More to the foreground is shown a river, being the nearby River Bure - or the water course 'Racu' from which the village may have taken its' name. In front of the river is shown a man ploughing, using a Rackheath type plough.

Right at the top of the main panel a monk is reading from a prayer book representing the priory which is supposed to have stood in the village. To the right of the monk is a sheep to represent Rackheath Common and the law which gave the villagers the right to graze sheep on the common.

The small panel on the right hand side of the sign represents Rackheath aerodrome used by the USAAF during the war.

The spendrels below the name plate depict on the left the Pettus family coat of arms and on the right the Stracey coat of arms.

THE PHOTOGRAPHS

I apologize for the quality of the photographs. My camera malfunctioned soon after arrival in Britian, a leak of some kind and a malfunctioning light meter, so my B & W prints and eleven rolls of color slides are not too good.

As important, or more important, to the veterans of the 467th Bombardment Group (H) than the convention reunion in Norwich or who was there or what we did is shown in the Rackheath Village sign photograph.

Each village, town, city, in the United Kingdom of Great Britian has accepted the obligation of erecting a unique identity sign to commemorate the thirtieth anniversay of Queen Elizabeth II's ascention to the thorne.

Remembering, being reminded, that the area surrounding Rackheath has recorded history back to the middle 1200s, look at the right panel in the photograph of the Rackheath Village sign which was dedicated and unveiled while we were present on May 30, 1983; a B-24 Liberator bomber of the 467th BG is prominently depicted. I interpret this to mean that we, the 467th at Rackheath, was one of the most significant events in the over 700 years of this community. I, personally, find this very humbling, that in a little over a year, we, all of us, assigned or attached to the 467th, through no special effort of the majority of us, are so honored by these most wonderful people of the village and area, and that we, the 467th, through this recognition, will be remembered there, if no where else, as long as there is a community in Rackheath.

The people of Rackheath Village and the area displayed genuine affection to us, we represented the 467th BG. And it was not just those who knew us, were there when we were there, it was also the children and the grandchildren of our contemporaries, each pleased to meet us, anxious to meet us, to be with us, to show us genuine love and affection.

The only thing we were asked to do was to send the names of all of those who served at Rackheath to them so that the names could be inscribed in a book, a roll. I will do this by sending a copy of Healey's The 467th Bombardment Group, about 2500 names, and copies of all orders naming personel that I have in hand. If you would like to participate in this effort, send me duplicate copies of orders in your memorabelia so that I can forward them also.

Frank, know it is a long way but Join us in Day ton. You will enjoy the reunion and we will enjoy having you with us.
