FROM THE PREZ / 2ADA GROUP VICE PRESI-DENT WALTER J. MUNDY:

This year, September 1996 - September 1997 has been a very active year for me. It has been rewarding, memorable and another highlight in my life. Thanks to all the 467th and the 2nd ADA members and supporters.

As President of the 467th Bombardment Group (H) Assoc. Ltd., it was my pleasure to have a Board of Directors that responded to my requests and supported the programs we had on going. We found a "permanent home" for our marker property at Rackheath and the care and maintenance of the markers and flag is in good physical and financial shape.

We continued our pursuit of the Presidential Unit Citation that was "lost in the shuffle" at the end of the War. However, it does not look like the Department of Defense will act on it favorably at this late date. AB previously reported we have been working on getting the 2ADA and B-24 presence at the OAF Heritage Museum. This project also includes a great dedicated effort by Kevin Coolidge, son of Miles Coolidge, to identify, sort and duplicate all of the 467th operational records that we have collected, including mission photographs and target strike photos. A copy of these records will be sent to the Memorial Library in Norwich and to the 8th AF Historical Museum. A special thanks to Kevin, and his wife, Kelli Coolidge.

For those members of the 467th that were not able to attend the 1997 Convention at the Nevele Hotel in Ellenville, NY, the Convention had approximately 169 of your friends and fellow Veterans. We hope that many of you who could not attend this year will attend next year. It will be at the Sheraton Hotel in St. Louis, MO, September 17th to 22nd, 1998.

This years Convention was highlighted by two tours. The first tour was to the United States Military Academy at West Point, where we had a ceremony at the Flight Memorial. General Christman, USMA Superintendent provided ~ Color Guard, Rifle Squad, Chaplain and addressed the ceremony honoring Col. Shower, Col. Holdrege and Col. Herzberg, who were West Point graduates. Gen. Christman also lead our memorial ceremony, placing a wreath in memory of all those who gave their lives in combat. Gen. Christman's and my address at the ceremony are presented in this issue for the benefit of those who could not attend this very moving and impressive ceremony presented by the US Military Academy.

The second tour took us to the Library and home of Franklin D. Roosevelt and the Vanderbilt Mansion. It was a memorable and interesting journey back to visit our war time Commander-in-Chief's historical records of our crusade.

The Convention was, in my humble opinion, one of our most productive with respect to launching our legacy program for providing a B-24 model at the Heritage Museum. This program accomplished the center piece of the 2nd Air Division and the 467th exhibit at the Mighty Eighth Air Force Heritage Museum and the Air Force Academy. I was overwhelmed by the generosity and support of the fund raising that was accomplished before, during and after the Convention. We raised, by donation and pledge, over \$22,000.00 of the \$25,000.00 needed to provide a 1/6 scale B-24 model. Our Board supported our fund drive and the membership in turn supported the plan. I wanted every member, associate and widow to have the opportunity to participate in providing the B-24 model. I sincerely hope that as many as read the "POOP from GROUP" will find a way to contribute. It will be there long after we have folded our wings.

There were 169 attendees at the convention. Of that total, three were present one day for the banquet and four were present for two days. There were 149 attendees that took the West Point tour and 120 attendees that took the Hyde Park/Vanderbilt tour.

The Convention attendees list shown in this issue is the latest and

I would like to thank every one personally for the support of this project. I especially thank Ralph Davis and Vince LaRussa of the 467th Board of Directors, and Ralph Giesecke for their outstanding effort in support of providing this legacy. Those who contributed so generously know that the 467th Bomb Group achievements will be recognized by millions of our future generations who will visit the Mighty Eighth Air Force Museum and the U.S. Air Force Academy,

As your 2nd AD Group Vice President, I want to take this opportunity to encourage all of the 467th Association members to also join the 2nd ADA. The dues are only \$15 per year and the three Journals published each year will be of interest particularly with respect to the Memorial Library in Norwich and the other activities of the 2nd ADA. MEMORIAL CEREMONY AT THE USMA. FLIGHT MEMORIAL SEPT. 25, 1997 WALTER J. MUNDY

Welcome remarks were given by Walter Mundy honoring our commander that graduated from the USMA:

Colonel Albert J. Shower Colonel Fred Holdrege Colonel Allen Herzberg

As well as those within the 467th who have their lives in combat and who have passed away since then. The ceremony was conducted by Major Fasio, aide to General Christman. The colors were posted, the pledge of allegiance was spoken, Chaplain Cook gave the invocation and Major Fasio introduced Lt. General Christman. General Christman is a 1965 graduate if USMA and took command last year as the 55th superintendent. General Christman's address was as follows:

"It is a great privilege for me to join you on this glorious day as your honor the memory of Colonel Albert Shower and other veterans of the 467th Bombardment Group. Your sacrifices and those of sister organizations within the Eighty Air Force have established a timeless reminder for all Americans of the price of freedom. For the casualty ratios suffered by the Eighth Air Force were among the highest of any tactical unit in the Second World War. As I look around and see the faces of so many veterans, I stand in awe of your achievements. The 467th Bombardment Group (H) - your group was activated on the 1st of August 1943. The original cadre consisted of 35 Officers and 155 Enlisted men: ultimately, some 3,000 men were associated with the unit. Colonel Albert Shower, a graduate of the West Point Class of 1935, assumed command of the Group on 1 November 1943, and deployed it to England from February to March 1944. Two of the Group's Senior Officers, Colonel Fred Holdrege, class of 42, and Colonel Allen Herzberg, class of 39 were also West Pointers. Flying B-24 Liberators, the Group's initial mission was directed against targets in France on the 10th of April. In the months that followed, the 467th attacked harbor facilities at Kiel, chemical plants at Bonn, power plants at Hamm, steel works at Osnabruck and the aircraft plants at Brunswick. By the time that the Group flew its final mission in April, 1945, it had completed a total of 212 Combat Mission's and dropped over 13,000 tons of Bombs. The 467th lost 49 aircraft while suffering 236 killed or missing in action. Of particular note was the mission against gun positions at Pointe De Grave, France on April 14, 1945. The Group's bombing accuracy on the mission was the best performance by any unit in the Eighth Air Force up to that time. Yes, these were truly remarkable achievements - but there is much more to your story than just cold historical facts and statistics.

As I prepared to speak to you today, I was reminded vividly of a Memorial Day Ceremony I attended in 1994 at the Large American Cemetery in the Ardennes. The Crosses and Stars of David seemed to stretch endlessly before us. I was especially impressed by the large

number who have their final rest in that peaceful and beautiful place. At that particular ceremony, Commandant Paul Moors, a Belgian veteran who had fought side-by-side with Americans in the Liberation of Europe, delivered the tribute. It was the most moving Memorial Day speech I've ever heard, and I thought it would be especially appropriate to share some of those words with you today.

Commandant Moors talked to his "friends" in the cemetery, the way soldiers talked to each other during that time probably not too unlike today's exchanges among friends who share the experience of combat. Facing these friends in that cemetery, he made the following remarks":

"On this very special Memorial Day, we are back here again, among your all - We the Belgian Volunteers of war who lived and fought with you prestigious Army in 1944 and 45, because it's an Anniversary deserve a special salute from all of us today. So as we used to say jokingly, every morning, in those days, I'm telling you; "Fellows, rise and shine, today is your day for the message I have for you". My friends, GI's, when the roaring jet fighters will ply over you in a few minutes, please consider the enormous noise of their engines as the cheers of the large faithful Belgian crowd shouting: "Thanks for what you have done, Thank You, Thank You. Merci".

And May I add to the poignant words of Commandant Moors, thanks to each and every one of you veterans who are here today, veterans of that terrible World War which claimed the youth of so many Americans. You are our heroes, the very personification of the ideals we hold so dear here at West Point and which are expressed so eloquently by our motto: "Duty, Honor, Country." May we never forget - You truly are the ones President Clinton had in mind when he said on the edge of Pointe Du Hoc, "When you were young, you and your generation saved the world!"

Upon completion of General Christman's address, General Christman, Colonel's Shower, Holdrege and Herzberg laid a wreath at the memorial in honor of members of the 467th Bombardment Group. A moment of silence was observed, then a volley was fired, followed by taps. Walter Mundy gave the closing remarks:

General Christman, thank you for your impressive presentation and thank you Major Fasio and Chaplain Cook, and our thanks to your Color Guard, Rifle Squad and Bugler.

To those Veterans who flew the B-24's, some may ask how did you keep going? We say:

It was Hard When Col. Shower ordered training missions.

It was Easy.... When everyone did their job.

It was Hard....For the Colonel to send up a max. effort mission knowing there would be losses.

It was Easy....For the troops to "Hate His Guts" because of his demand for excellence.

It was Hard....To get up at 3:00 to 4:00 A.M.

It was Easy....To suit up.

It was Hard....To think about the target.

It was Easy....To check the airplane.

It was Hard....Sweating the take off and forming up.

It was Easy....When everything worked.

It was Hard....As the flack marked the route and we searched the skies for fighters.

It was Easy To stay busy.

It was Hard....Guessing if evasive action would work.

It was Hard....To watch the B-24 next to you fall smoking, burning out of control.

It was Easy....To thank God it wasn't you bailing out, or going down.

It was Hard....To see what we did to the target.

It was Easy....To head for home base when the flak and fighters went away.

It was Hard....To talk about the mission after debriefing.

It was Easy.... When VE Day came and those left all went home.

It was Hard....To forget our days in England and our English friends - So we didn't.

It was Easy....In time...To realize that the Colonel's did their job because they wanted to do everything in their power to save our lives.

It was Hard....To not come to Honor, Respect and Love the men that believed in what they learned here."Duty, Honor, Country" and what was instilled in their lives they instilled in the fine young men of the 467th.

It was Easy....To understand that war is hell and the Freedom we enjoy was paid for by those who gave their lives and those who offered their lives and survived.

Walter Mundy concluded with "and as Walter Cronkite said -That's the way it was". Chaplain Cook gave the benediction, Major Fasio ordered the colors retired and that concluded the ceremony.

MISCELLANEA PHILLIP G. DAY

Well, I went to Convention 97 and I am glad I did. Miss Cille and I enjoyed the four days of camaraderie and good cheer to the fullest. The Nevele Hotel was not constructed for persons with handicaps in walking, but with excellent care from spouses and friends, those of us so afflicted were able to get around in the hotel even if it meant those in wheelchairs had to detour through the kitchen to get to our dining area. The Day Room/Hospitality Room was quite large and adequate for the display of memorabilia, for the business meeting of the Association and for the cocktail parties held there each evening. An inconvenience was that the room also served as a passage for other hotel visitors and staff from place to place and their passage was at times disruptive. The food served in the dining area was very good, approaching excellent at times and copious, I gained four unneeded pounds. Those who took the bus trips were not so fortunate, I understand the box lunches left a lot to be desired. But in the hotel you had a menu for every meal, breakfast was the same each day, but a variety of breakfast things that allowed you to have something different each day if you wished. Lunch and supper were at least one salad, two soups, six entrees-meats, excellent beef, fish, pastas, fruit plates, others, six deserts. Take one or ever how many you wished. The wait staff were competent, though at times trying, they seldom poured water, getting a glass of tea was an effort, coffee service was the better of their liquid efforts. Some things were just not available, for instance Salsa, not even that made in New York City! All in all, bordering on excellent.

The memorabilia display was excellent. I cannot say enough about the presentation of Group materials and photo albums that were there due to the efforts and expertise of Kevin Cooledge-AF who over the last nine months reproduced all of the Group memorabilia including the first fifteen years of POOP FROM GROUP and put all in indexed loose leaf binder format. the presentation (loose leaf format) had the copy machine in virtually constant use. Kevin also reproduced Col. Shower's collection of Group combat pictures, arranged in mission sequence. He was aided in this endeavor by Jay Shower who arranged for the loan of the collection. Also displayed were collections of Andy Wilkinson-AH, Perry Watts-AH, Bob McEwen, Walt Mundy, Tom Steranko and others I cannot remember at this time. I spent many enjoyable hours in the room, looking at the displays and TALKING to any one who would listen to me or who had questions I could answer, and there were many of those.

Also there were PX items displayed. Paul Hatten brought the last of the patches (no Group) and sold a bunch at 4 for \$10. Ralph Davis had enameled metal pins for sale, Kevin had a display of shirts he can personalize with name, squadron, duty, crew pictures and also a series, by months, of combat mission targets on a map in color, very attractive. He also can personalize your missions on a map of Germany and Occupied Territories. I am sure that all of these items will be covered in other areas of POOP.

One more thing and I'll quit. Donations and pledges to procure the one/sixth scale B-24, in "Witchcraft" regalia for presentation to the Mighty Eighth Air Force Heritage Museum was not quite enough to meet the estimated cost before the Banquet. After a very impressive talk by Ralph Giesecke, Group Engineering Officer, on the worthiness of the project, Vincent LaRussa went among those present for the Banquet and in five minutes or less got pledges of \$500 each from eleven veterans. The fund requirement was met! Ralph, you and Vincent did one hell of a sales job, both my very good friends and the whole Association. God love you, I do.

I have not been able to answer several historical inquiries as the Group memorabilia generally in my custody has not yet been returned by Kevin. Just as soon as it is I will get right on the research and get out the answers. Just bear with me a bit.

THE PARISH OF RACKHEATH 1066 - 1997 BY PHILLIP G. DAY

A year ago in POOP 15-3 I asked if someone in Rackheath would write me of the history of Rackheath for my own information and to share with you in POOP. Perry Watts-AH of Rackheath accepted the request and at Convention 97 presented me with a 125 page review of the history which had taken him and his son, James E. P. Watts, MA, nine months to research and compile. I have had no formal courses in English history and but have read a bit of it. I have visited the battle field at Hastings where this all begins and know that the Norman William defeated Harold Godwinson (Godwinson was killed in the battle), the non-royal Saxon King, in the Battle of Hastings ending the Anglo-Saxon period of England in 1066. Beginning William's successful, though lengthy, effort to secure his position. Through building of fortifications, baronial grants to insure loyalty and through reformation in the church, after five years his kingdom was secured. There has been a royal ruler in England since that time except for the period, 1649 to 1660, when Oliver Cromwell, Lord Protector, was the ruler until coronation of Charles II.

Watts writes that sometime around the year 1050 the area of the present site of Rackheath was called Ra-Cheisham or Rackeia or Rakeia and was approximately two miles square. The Ra is possibly Danish for stream. In Doomesday it is listed as Ra-Cheisham and the principle Lordship was in the King and a Godric is shown as

Stewart of it for him.

Originally there were two distinct villages, Rackheath Magna (North?) and its church dedicated to "All Saints" and Rackheath Parva (South?) and its church dedicated to the "Holy Trinity". Both of these churches were on the tax rolls of 1200. Neither of these exist today, the present All Saints was built over 600 years ago in the period 1300 - 1350, the present Holy Trinity, "the new church", was built in 1959. Until 1422 these two villages and the churches were separate and distinct. All Saints first rector is recorded in 1300 and nine are recorded before consolidation in 1422. The first rector of Holy Trinity is recorded in 1302, the last before consolidation was appointed in 1407, a total of twenty-two. After 1422, thirty-two rectors are recorded for the combined Magna and Parva churches, a total of 63 rectors for the 697 years of the churches.

The records of rectors is of much interest as in ecclesiastical usage the name of the presenter of the Rector is listed, so as the churches belonged to the Lord Of The Manor he had the right to name rectors and an assumption can be made that the presenter was The Lord Of The Manor. In feudal times the district over which a lord held authority was the manor, more recently it is a landed estate, usually with a main residence, the owner of which still holds some feudal rights over the land. The Lord Of The Manor we are most familiar with is Edward Paulet Stracey, was in 1871 and in 1888 became the seventh baronet. Sir Edward Paulet Stracey, Bart. He was married twice, his first wife died and the wife we saw him with was Kathleen Emily Robertson, whom he married in 1935. Their daughter was Dereen. A Rackheath Hall was built on Rackheath Estate about 400 years ago by possibly Sir John Pettus who was knighted in 1608. The Pettus family fell on hard times, for what ever reasons, and in about 1772 upon the death of Sir Horatio Pettus, sixth baronet of Rackheath Estate, the estate was let out to a tenant until about 1780 wherein it was sold to Sir Edward Stracey.

Sir Edward, the first baronet of the Straceys of Rackheath family, began construction on what we knew as Rackheath Hall in 1820. His heir, Sir Edward H. T., began enlargement and embellishment of the Hall in 1850. This work was finally completed in 1854. In 1851 The Golden Gates were purchased in Norwich and installed, flanked by the Gate Keepers' lodges. The bridge across the lake was built, possibly by Sir Henry Josias Stracey, fifth baronet 1855 - 1885.

The death of Sir Edward Paulet Stracey occurred in 1949 and I have been led to understand that the inheritance taxes imposed on his estate were so high that it was necessary to sell the acreage still held in the manor, approximately 600 acres form the sale in 1919, to satisfy the tax assessment. Sir Michael George Motley Stracey was the eighth baronet and because of the sale in 1949 he inherited only the title. He was succeeded by Sir John Simon Stracey, the ninth and present day baronet. He resides in Montreal, Canada. The hall has been sold several times since 1949, is presently vacant but it is thought that the present owners are contemplating making it into an apartment complex.

Accompanying the Watts presentation I received was a letter from James E. P. Watts, Perry's son, which I reproduced here. Though addressed to me, it is for all veterans of the 467th.

"I derived great pleasure in being involved, albeit in a minor way, in the compilation of this history of Rackheath. Without doubt you will understand my comments as follows:

I am pleased my father (Perry Watts) listened to me in the fore part of this year, accepted my advice and 'persuasion', and continued on the research of the history which otherwise would have been abandoned in the very early days of research.

Although I was not born until 1974, some thirty years after you came over with the 467th Group, I would like you to know I am very grateful to you and your colleagues and appreciate you coming over to my country and helping us out in that "hour of need". Many of us young people, although we had not been born at the time, most sincerely appreciate that valued support given by the people of America and particular by yourself and all the veterans of the 467th Group.

REPORT ON STATUS OF P.U.C.:

Ralph Davis reported on our continuing efforts to secure a Presidential Unit Citation for our Bomb Group. It seems to be conceded that the Citation should be due to our excellent bombing record during the war, but politics continue to intervene. However, a new avenue through veterans organization will be approached.

REPORT ON 1997 CONVENTION:

President Mundy, who served as Convention Chairman, thanked the hotel and its staff and the bus lines for good service. He thanked his wife Ruth, and his Assistants. Syd Katz and Vivian, for assistance in handling the details of the convention. Ruth was in charge of registration and secretarial details. Syd arranged the nightly entertainment and it was truly excellent. The performers represented Broadway at its best. Accomplishing the pledging of \$25,000 for the wood B-24 model to be painted in Witchcraft colors and the glorious day at West Point in which Commandant of West Point, Lt. General Christman, praised the 467th for its great record in the war and gave special honors to three of its distinguished graduates, Colonels Al Shower, Fred Holdrege and Allen Herzberg who so ably led the 467th. Squadron Commander, Col. Bruce Palmer, was also present at the ceremony and shared in the honors bestowed on the Group and its Officers.

<u>REPORT ON PLEDGE MONEY TO MIGHTY</u> <u>EIGHTH HERITAGE MUSEUM:</u>

President Mundy announced that we were making the final payment of \$5,000 on our pledge of \$10,000 to the Museum in Pooler, Georgia, to be used for operating expense.

<u>REPORT ON STATUS OF THE WOODEN B-24</u> <u>MODEL FOR THE MIGHTY 8TH HERITAGE MU-SEUM:</u>

President Mundy recited the events leading up to our decision to take a lead role in providing a 1/6 wooden scale model of a B-24 with the 467th marking (Witchcraft) at a cost of \$25,000, to be donated to the Mighty 8th Heritage Museum in Savannah, Georgia. Many members complained during visits to the Museum at our 1996 Convention in Pooler that the B-17 received an unequal share of the Museum space to the detriment of the B-24. Walt Mundy, Vince LaRussa and others registered this complaint in a meeting with General Shuler, Director of the Museum. He promised to correct the problem.

As reported by Walt Mundy, who is our delegate to the Executive Committee of 2ADA, in the August, 1997 issue of POOP from GROUP, the 2ADA has for some time planned to present a 1/6 scale bronze model B-24 to the Air Force Academy with the necessary wood scale model to be installed at the Mighty 8th Heritage Museum. At several meetings of the 2ADA Executive Committee (Ex Com) action was adjourned until October 1997, to commence a fund drive to raise the estimated cost of \$175,000. All of the B-24 groups would be asked to join in the drive. At this point, the Directors of the 467th with its convention coming up in September, 1997, saw an opportunity to be a leader of all of the groups by taking upon itself the project to build a wooden model of the B-24 at a cost of \$25,000 with its group markings (Witchcraft) painted thereon and to present it to the Museum.

The Directors wanted to be in a position to pledge the use of this model to the Executive Committee meeting of 2ADA in October, 1998 as its pledge to the proposed \$175,000 bronze model to be presented to the Air Force Academy. Ownership of this wooden model would remain in the 467th and at the time of presentation to the Heritage Museum would have the colors of "Witchcraft" painted thereon.

In furtherance of this goal, a Pledge Agreement was printed in the August, 1997 issue of POOP from GROUP and a copy included in the package given to each registrant at the September Convention in New York.

President Mundy announced at this meeting that approximately \$7,000 had been received in pledges at the time and that additional pledges had been made.

After a discussion, the following resolution was duly passed:

"RESOLVED that the 467th Bomb Group will provide a wooded mold model of a B-24 at its cost of \$25,000 to be raised by donations. The wooden model will be donated to the Mighty 8th Heritage Museum with "Witchcraft" colors painted thereon."

It should be mentioned that at the banquet that evening the matter of the B-24 model and the required \$25,000 was again mentioned. Our Treasurer stated that total pledges were still short of our goal. At this point, Vince LaRussa took a packet of pledge forms among the assembled diners and called for 10 members to come forward and pledge \$500 each to put us over the top. In a truly remarkable show of support, eleven stepped forward to accomplish the effort in a matter of minutes.
